Mission

To provide students with hands-on, interactive reading of quality literature and non-fiction text.

- > .5 elective credit course
- Read 5 books from the list; this requirement can vary based on which books are chosen
- Select 1 or more reading standards to be assessed
- Complete 1 culminating project based on at least 2 of the 5 books
- Teachers may give credit in an online course if students select a book that compliments the course



STEP 1:

CHOOSE 5 BOOKS FROM THE LIST

Who can take the course?

Anyone! Feeling overwhelmed by the amount of online reading? Interested in "logging off" while continuing to work on your reading skills? This .5 credit course gives you that opportunity.

When will classes take place?

The class is predominantly an independent reading course, but 3 check-ins will take place before the culminating project is due at the end of the semester.

Do you seek balance in the way you are in taking information? Do you enjoy having a tangible book in your hands? Do you enjoy reading? If you answered yes to any of these questions, the Independent Reading Elective might be a good fit for you.
