I may have more specific directions later as we learn more, but the following will not change for our class.

Your grade as of last Friday will be frozen for the time being. I am still updating with the most recent work that was recently turned in. **Once that is done you can make-up any missing assignments by doing the weekly assignments outlined in the "Covid Closure Curriculum"**(next page). Each weekly assignment can take the place of a missing assignment, or serve as grade improvement for an assignment or quiz. When you turn it in indicate how you would like it credited---"Make-up for \_\_\_\_\_ " or "Improvement for \_\_\_\_\_ " or extra credit. (See samples on next page). **These assignments are not REQUIRED but can improve your grade.**

In Google Classroom you will see that I have changed our class name to "Covid Closure Sport Lit." In that class you will find weekly assignments due on Fridays. You can select any of the options to do.

I know this is scary and unsettling. History sometimes can be a source of comfort (It's true!). There are many examples in U.S. and world history of great disturbances to daily life. In a very real way this is a war that you are experiencing—with many parallels to the past---schools were closed for periods in the Civil War, the economy was disrupted greatly in the Revolution, and food was rationed and some things were very hard to find in World War Two. We've already learned about the 1918 Influenza pandemic that was very frightening, but also passed and the country not only recovered quickly, but thrived.

The assignments that you can choose from are also ways for you to reflect on what is happening. They will be archived, along with those of your classmates, and will serve as future primary source documents!
